




Ansel Adams was born in San Francisco and lived from 1902 to 1984. His preferred thing to photograph is landscape. All of his photos are in black and white, and looking at some of Adams' portfolio he loved to capture mountains all around the world. He was very strategic about his shots, for example, he took his photos straight on with a very level view. His shadows and highlights are very prominent and crisp making everything stand out.

Impact

Ansel was one of the founders of Group f/64. This term refers to a large-format view camera to achieve a photo that is high value. The smallest camera lens aperture is used, which produces the sharpest depth of field. He was strongly inspired by Paul Strand, who was an American photographer. Ansel Adams has a lot of different photos and his legacy will always be remembered by photographers.




Introduction
